## STATE SOCIETY NEWS

**ARKANSAS.** A marker was placed in Pine Bluff at the grave of Quapaw Chief Saracen, who died ca 1840, and plans are being made to mark the grave of the wife of Chief John Ross in Little Rock.

**GEORGIA.** A third chapter, *Augusta Treaty*, will be chartered in January; they have contributed to the Scholarship Fund honoring Organizing Governor, Frederica Lofquist. *New Echota Chapter* gave to the fund in memory of Mary Eleanor Grantham Wood.

**IOWA.** Three members attended Council 2000 and reported for State Governor Beverly Lindsey, who is starting her second term in that office.

**KANSAS.** The arts and crafts director of the Indian Center in Kansas City presented a program for them and they are helping enlarge the Native American book collection at Haskell Univ. at Lawrence.

**KENTUCKY.** A letter from State Governor Sharon Withers tells of her recent trip to Johns Hopkins for her hearing problems. She feels she is now in competent and caring hands.

**LOUISIANA, NORTH CAROLINA, UTAH AND VIRGINIA.** These are still organizing states. Have you friends who might like to join there? Contact the State Governor if you can help.

**MARYLAND.** The Extinct Algonkian Indians was a favorite program in August, based on a 1590 edition of Thomas Harriot's beautifully illustrated book *A Briefe and True Report of the New Found Land of Virginia*.

**MASSACHUSETTS.** A program on Congressional Cemetery told of two American Indians buried there. Choctaw Chief Push-ma-ta-ha and Taza, son of Apache Chief Cochise, both died while visiting the capitol.

**MISSOURI.** Margaret Carr reported that she and her students enjoyed her two years as Indian Current Events Chairman. Their work will be housed with our collection at the Atlanta McElreath Library.

**MICHIGAN.** Five members attended Council 2000.

**TEXAS.** State Governor Rosemarie Landmesser reported 114 members, 2 chapters, \$2,050.00 to our scholarship fund and a new scholarship planned for the Alabama Coushatta Indian Reservation.

## Scholarship Fund Grows

### Navajo mother of four is 2000 winner

Susan Chamberlain has really been out beating the tom-tom this year to raise scholarship funds. Already our annual award was \$1,000.00 and she is talking of raising that amount after over \$4,000.00 came in the day of the Council meeting. Thank you, Susan, States, Chapters and individuals who made this possible.

Alice Jacobs and her judging team agonized over twenty-two qualified applicants before selecting 29 year old Carma Peshlakai, junior at Arizona State University. She maintains a 3.0 grade average. Born and raised on a Navajo Reservation, she has the support of her husband and four children, ages 3 to 15. Her post graduate plans are for social service work on a reservation.

Second place winner was Bernadine Jones, last year's scholarship recipient, who wrote in detail (3 typed pages) of her accomplishments and joy in her studies to become a nurse to the Navajo people. She thanked our Society for helping her pay for books, gas money and tuition.

Hardwick Johnson (background) drew the winning ticket and Shirle Williams won the *Georgia Landscape* painting by D Rice that was offered through the efforts of Sally Hlavay of Alberta, Canada to raise scholarship money.

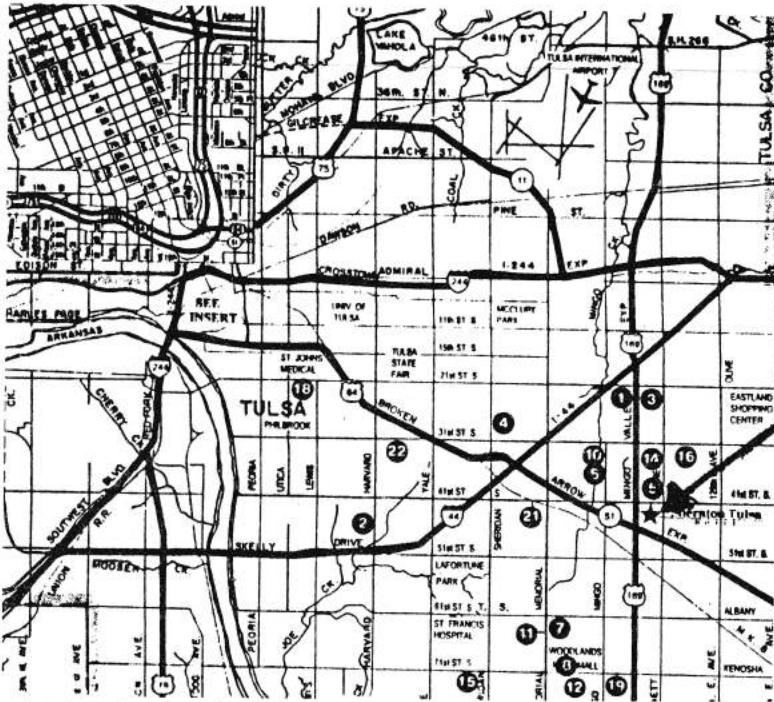

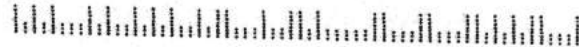

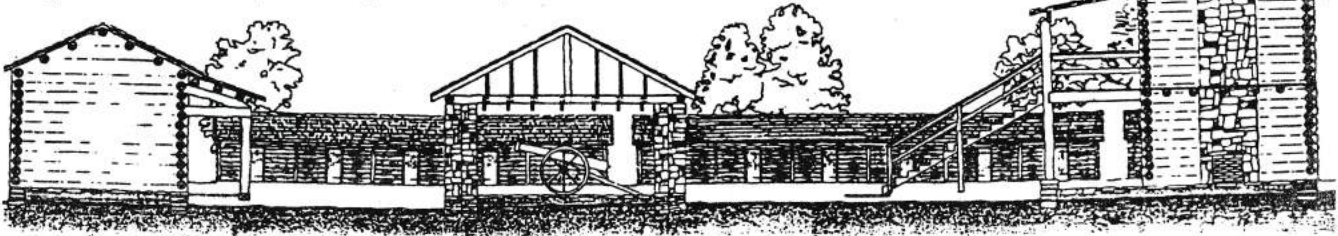

## AN INVITATION TO THE END OF THE TRAIL OF TEARS

We'll show you historic old Fort Gibson (1824-1890) where the Seventh Infantry met the emigrant Indians as they arrived by land and by boat in the 3 Forks Area.



Fort Gibson National Cemetery is the burial site of Indians and soldiers alike, including veteran of the War of 1812 and Talahina Rogers, Cherokee wife of Sam Houston.



Bacone College was established in 1880 as Indian University and still has above 50% Indian enrollment. Ataloha Lodge has a fine Indian collection.

The 5 Civilized Tribes Museum was built in 1875 of native stone to serve as the Superintendency for the tribes. It has served as a school and orphanage.

"Hunter's Home" at Park Hill near Tahlequah was built in 1845 for Minerva Ross (niece of Chief John Ross) and her husband George M. Murrell and is Oklahoma's only remaining antebellum home.
