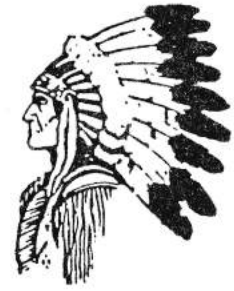

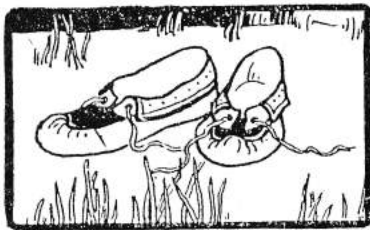

## MAILING LABEL CHANGE

Several members might have noticed their Calumet Winter 2000 mailing labels did not contain all their address information, the addresses had to be completed by hand. Because of this, the editor and printing chairman will be trying to update their computer files to include current postal abbreviations. Likewise, many members may note their address title abbreviated. This is being done for economy and since CSDIW members want to free up as many funds as possible for scholarships, these chairmen are confident the members will understand.

If your Calumet address doesn't include your full 9-digit zip code, then CSDIW needs it for the record. Does your post office not utilize the +4 system? Some small post offices still don't. If this is the case, check with the postmaster to see if they have a preference for the +4. If they don't CSDIW can assign 0000 to your membership information. With the new postal rates, it may be possible to save further postage costs if all bulk mail has the "complete" address. Additionally, if there were typographical errors, etc. you need to let us know.

Membership dues (\$10) must reach the Treasurer General by August 1 each year. State, Provincial Treasurers be aware of this and plan to change your bylaws to reflect this date. ## BYLAWS CHANGES

In order to bring the bylaws into compliance with the vote of the 2000 Council the following changes were approved at the 27 January 2001 Board of Management meeting to be presented for adoption at the Annual Council 15 September 2001 in Atlanta.

### ARTICLE VI COUNCILS

Section 1. Delete first sentence and replace with: "The Annual Council of the Continental Society shall be held during the month of September each year at a location to be determined by the Executive Board. Invitations from various State/Provincial Societies will be considered." *Article VI, Section 1, will then read:* "The Annual Council of the Continental Society shall be held during the month of September each year at a location to be determined by the Executive Board. Invitations from various State/Provincial Societies will be considered. A quorum shall be twenty-one (21) members in good standing duly registered."

### ARTICLE VIII BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

*Add a new section to be numbered 4:*  
Section 4. The winter meeting shall be known as the Winter Board of Management Meeting and shall be held in, or in the vicinity of, Atlanta, Georgia during the period from January 1<sup>st</sup> and February 15<sup>th</sup> each year.

### ARTICLE X COMMITTEES

Section 3. Because the appointment of these two committees should be the responsibility of the State/Provincial Society hosting the Council Meeting, they should be removed from the list of Committee Chairmen to be appointed by the Governor General:  
2. Credentials/Registration and 12. Council

Hospitality. 3. Lineage Research is actually handled by the Registrar as is 9. Junior Membership, so they should be removed. Following the phrase: The Governor General shall appoint add "Any necessary committees, including, but not limited to:" *and this section should then read:*

Section 3. The Governor General shall appoint any necessary committees, including, but not limited to:

1. Curator
2. Auditing
3. Insignia
4. Yearbook/Directory
5. Sashes & Ribbons
6. Bylaws
7. Printed Supplies
8. Finance
9. Scholarship

### ARTICLE XI STATE OR PROVINCIAL SOCIETIES

Section 4. Remove: "shall have ten (10) or more members and" as this repeats Section 1. Omit the "a/an" preceding all officers.

*Section 4 will then read:* "Every State/Provincial Society shall have the following officers: Governor, Deputy Governor, Chaplain, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, Historian and Librarian."



### 2000-2002 YEARBOOK

A new 2000-2002 yearbook will be ready for sale in the very near future. It will be the same 5½"x8½" format as the 1998 one, punched to fit a three ring binder. The new 2000-2002 yearbook will be available from the Supply Chairman and at the September Council.

## INSTRUCTIONS FOR PREPARATION OF CSDIW APPLICATION PAPERS

Upon the recommendation of our Registrar General, the Winter Board voted to cease accepting other society's approved applications as proof for membership in Continental Society Daughters of Indian Wars, beginning June 1, 2001. Already it had been voted to cease requiring the applications to be notarized. Therefore, the Registrar General has drawn up new guidelines for filing applications.

New application papers have been printed and are available from the Supply Chairman for fifty cents a copy. They allow for both state and chapter officers to sign, when applicable, as well as the Registrar and Governor General, and have done away with the space for the notary, using instead the signatures of two sponsoring members on the front.

1. Prepare one original and one photocopy of your application paper. Do not affix signatures until the photocopy is made, as all signatures must be originals. Make your photocopy front and back, so that the copy is only two pages just like the original. Have two sponsors (members in good standing) sign on page one. ALL SIGNATURES MUST BE IN BLACK INK. If one of your sponsors lives elsewhere then include a letter of recommendation from her. Your sponsors must be members of the state to which you wish to become a member.
2. Dates, names and locations must be proven. Applicant's spouse(s) birth and death records are required and must be sent with your application. Copies of documentation must be enclosed.
3. Other Societies application papers will no longer be acceptable without proof for all facts given. This is a Society in its own right and as such MUST have a good set of papers with proof, which shows a connection from one generation to another.

4. UNDERLINE IN RED all pertinent information and write the generation number that the document proves in the upper right hand corner of the document. Put your documents in order of generation, starting with generation one. On the back side of the document put the following: Your name, State Society, Application or Supplemental, Ancestor's name and state of service. You can type the information one time, make a photocopy of it and run your documents on the back side through a copy machine.
5. Write your dates so:  
DAY MONTH YEAR.
6. Bible records are acceptable (title page must be included). Census records will also be acceptable as well as family records that have been published. There again the title page must be included.
7. Service can consist of actual hostilities or peaceable contact such as trader, agent, scout, interpreter, purchase of land from an Indian. Native Americans need only prove descent. While several wars are listed, be sure service was in an area where this type of hostility occurred. e.i. During the War of 1812, Indians were not present on the New Jersey Coast.
8. Enclose your check payable to the Treasurer General, CSDIW in the amount of \$45.00. Also on page two at the top, be sure you have your name exactly as you want it in the certificate the Society gives you.
9. If you have any questions, contact your State Registrar, Chapter Registrar or the Registrar General.

### REGISTRAR GENERAL'S WORKSHOP

The Registrar General will conduct a short workshop for State, Provincial and Chapter Registrars (or representative, if registrar not in attendance) in Atlanta, at the September Council. Be sure that your society will be represented to get this information. Time will be announced in Atlanta.

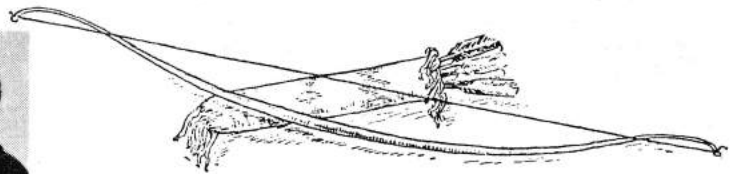
**APRIL 2001 - WASHINGTON, DC**

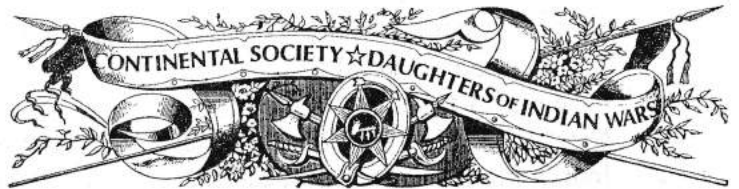

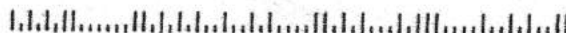
