PROPOSED BY LAWS CHANGE

AMENDMENT TO BYLAWS

Article VI Section 1 to be amended by striking after the word held "in, or in the vicinity of Atlanta, Georgia" and by removing the words "each year".

Article VI Section 1 now reads:

The Annual Council of the Continental Society shall be held in, or in the vicinity of Atlanta, Georgia, during the month of September each year. A quorum shall be twenty-one (21) members in good standing duly registered.

Article VI Section 1 to then read:

The Annual Council of the Continental Society shall be held during the month of September. A quorum shall be twenty-one (21) members in good standing duly registered.

PROPOSED BY LAWS CHANGE

AMENDMENT TO BYLAWS

Article IX Section 7 to be amended to delete the first sentence: "Life memberships are to be limited to ten percent of the dues-paying membership." and add the words 'life membership' to the beginning of the second sentence,.

Article IX Section 7 now reads:

Life memberships are to be limited to ten percent of the dues-paying membership. For members under age 60 a one-time fee of \$250.00 will be assessed, all other ages will pay \$200.00. These funds are to be kept in an escrow account with only the interest going into the general fund each year.

Article IX Section 7 to then read:

Life membership for members under age 60 a one-time fee of \$250.00 will be assessed, all other ages will pay \$200.00. These funds are to be kept in an escrow account with only the interest going into the general fund each year.

LEGEND OF THE INIDIAN PAINTBRUSH

An Indian legend describes the origin of the paintbrush: Each evening a young chief sat watching the sunset as the colors changed from rose to crimson to gold and then faded, leaving a gorgeous afterglow. He longed to be able to catch this beauty by painting it, but he had only his crude war paints made from pounded minerals and heavy, stiff brushes too clumsy to copy such nuances of color. The Georgia Chapters are active and growing, they meet during the year. The State Council will meet February 19th, 2005, when new State officers will be elected and installed.

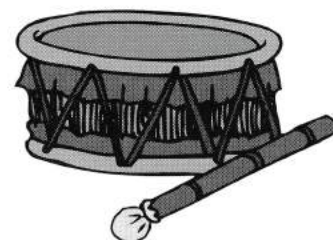

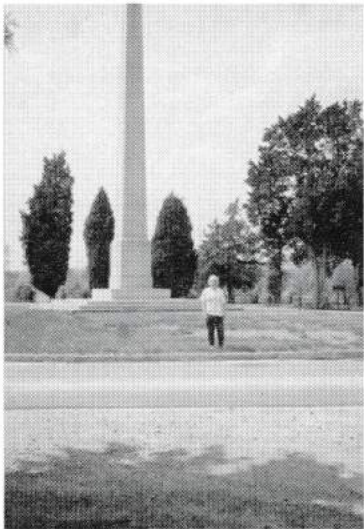

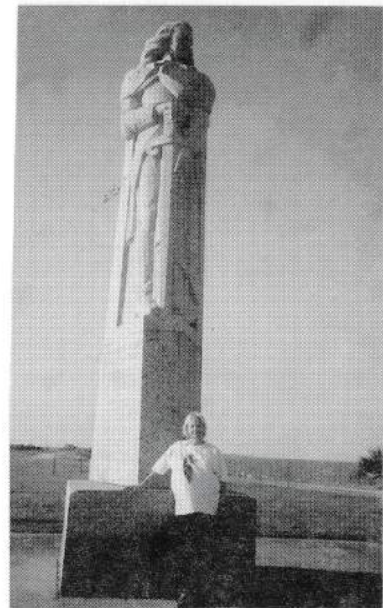

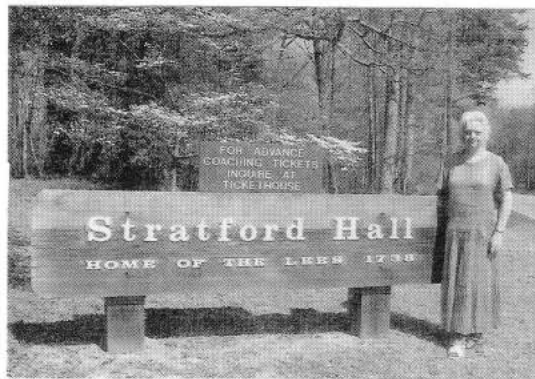

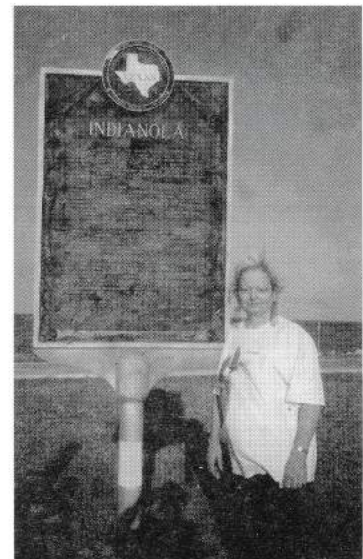

ROOSEVELT LITTLE WHITE HOUSE

Nestled into the wooded estate that is the Little White House Historic Site, the Franklin D. Roosevelt Memorial Museum emphasizes the impact that Georgia made on President Roosevelt during his administration. It was here that he learned of the struggles of rural Americans, influencing many policies that still affect citizens today.

The 11,000 square-foot museum chronicles Roosevelt's life, his role in America's recovery from the Great Depression, his leadership during World War II and his personal struggle with polio. Key exhibits include his hand-controlled 1938 Ford convertible, "Fireside Chats" playing on a 1930's radio, FDR's stagecoach used during parades, a film narrated by Walter Cronkite, and the naturally warm spring water that first brought Roosevelt to Georgia. Visitors can tour FDR's charming cottage, the guest house and servants' quarters left much as they were the day he suffered a stroke while posing for the "Unfinished Portrait" now displayed in the museum.
