MINUTES

Twenty-fourth Annual Council Meeting

September 15, 2012

9:15 AM

The Twenty-fourth Annual Council of the Continental Society Daughters of Indian Wars was called to order by Governor General Sally Hlavay.

The invocation was given by Chaplain General Carla Whitehurst Odom.

The membership in attendance was asked to stand, if able, and remain standing through the Ritual.

The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America was led by Organizing Secretary General Adele Davenport Bowyer.

The American's Creed was led by Historian General Helene Kirby Werner.

The Object of the Continental Society was read by First Deputy Governor General Shelby Ward.

The Salute to the Banner of the Continental Society Daughters of Indian Wars was led by Recording Secretary General Betty Keener Samaras.

After the group was seated the Governor General called on Twila Helferich, Governor of the Michigan Society, to bring the Official welcome. The Official response was given by First Deputy Governor Shelby Ward.

It was announced that none of the Honorary Governors General were in attendance. Jean Belew is now in a nursing home in Cartersville, Georgia.

The Governor General introduced the Officers General who were in attendance. First Deputy Governor Shelby Dean Ward, Second Deputy Governor Karen Kurth Hall, Chaplain General Carla Whitehurst Odom, Recording Governor General Betty Keener Samaras, Corresponding Secretary General Ann Scott Williams, Organizing Secretary General Adele Davenport Bowyer, Treasurer General Julia Ann "Judy" Farrigan, Historian General Helene Kirby Werner, Librarian General Cheryl "Cher" Miller Bucknam. Not in attendance were Registrar General Sharon Kaufelt Stine, Assistant Registrar General Mary Robin Refearn Towns, and Advisors Mary Little and Carol Belcher.

The members were asked to stand and be thanked for being present.

The first Credentials Report was called from the Credential Chairman Jacque-Lynn Schulman as follows. Continental Officers General 10, Honorary Governors General 0, Committee Chairmen 5, State/Provincial Governors 6, Members 13, Guests 4 for a total of 34 voting members and 38 in attendance.

The Credentials Chairman made a motion that the Credentials Report be made the official roll for the meeting. Motion carried and the voting strength of the Twenty-fourth Annual Council is Thirty-four. A quorum was declared by the Chair.

The next order of business was the adoption of the Standing rules for the Twenty-fourth Annual Council. Andrea Weyling, a member of the Bylaws Committee, read the Standing Rules. The Standing Rules were adopted as printed.

The next order of business was the adoption of the program. Judy Hull presented the program. It was adopted as printed.

The Governor General made the following appointments: 1) Parliamentarian Pro-Tern will be Andrea Weyhing. 2) The Minutes approval Committee will consist of Carla Whitehurst Odom, Karen Hall, and Adele Bowyer. 3) The time keeper will be Leslie Reynolds.

The Governor General announced that the minutes of the Twenty-third Annual Council, September 17, 2012 in Tempe, Arizona were approved by a committee of Margaret Simmons, Sharon Champlin and Robin Towns.

The Governor General asked for the first order of business to be the reports of the Officers General. Reports of offices not present will be read by the Corresponding Secretary General Ann Scott Williams. Reports given were: Governor General Sally Wood Hlavay, First Deputy Governor General Shelby Dean Ward, Second Deputy Governor General Karen Kurth Hall, Chaplain General Carla Whitehurst Odom, Recording Secretary General Betty Keener Samaras, Corresponding Secretary General Ann Scott Williams, Organizing Secretary General Adele Davenport Bowyer,

A recess of fifteen minutes was called at 10:00 AM. The meeting reconvened at 10:15 AM with the continuations of the officers' reports. Treasurer General Julia Ann "Judy" Farrigan, after giving her report gave the budget. It was adopted. Registrar General Sharon Stine's report was read by Ann Williams, Assistant Registrar General Robin Towns' report was read by Ann Williams. Historian General Helene Kirby Werner and Librarian General Cheryl "Cher" Miller Bucknam.

The officers were thanked for their services to the society.

The next order of business was the reports of the Continental Chairmen. The Corresponding Secretary General read the reports of the chairmen who were not present, but submitted a report. Committees: Audit - Mary Macke Walker; Calument - Karen Avery Miller; report sent and read by the Corresponding Secretary, Credentials - Jacque -Lynne Schluman; Finance - Judy Farrigan; Insignia Archives - Barbara McMullin; report read by Corresponding Secretary, Insignia Ordering- Camelle Redfearn Baxter; report read by Corresponding Secretary, Markers- Davine Roberts; report read by Corresponding Secretary, Membership - Karen Hall; Members-at-Large - Leslie Reynolds; Scholarship - Leslie Canavan; report read by Corresponding Secretary, Scholarship - Margaret Simmons; Supplies - Ann Scott Williams; Webmaster and Yearbook Betsy Phillips Jones; reports read by Corresponding Secretary, 25th Anniversary of CSDIW - Judy Farrigan.

The Governor General requested that the next order of business be the reports of the State and Provincial Governors. Alabama- Laura Clark Howell; read by the (CS), California - Patricia "Pat" Erwin Hugar; read by (CS), District of Columbia- Deputy Governor Lynne Schulman; Georgia - Deputy Governor Judy Farrigan; Illinois - Sharie Worrell read by Jane Screleinger; Kansas - Jean Lightner read by (CS); Michigan - Twila Barker Helferich; Missouri - Janice "Jan" Richey Stevens, read by (CS); South Carolina- Mary Armstrong; Texas - Mary Walker.

The Nominating committee of Betsy Jones, Jacque Schulman and Mary Glenn were asked to report. Jacque Schulman reported as follows: Governor General Shelby Ward; 1st Deputy Governor General Karen Hall; 2nd Governor General Ann Williams; Chaplain General Cher Bucknam; Recording Secretary General Helene Werner; Treasurer General Judy Farrigan; Organizing Secretary General Sharon Stine; Corresponding Secretary General Jacque Schulman; Registrar General Robin Towns; Historian General Twila Heferich; Librarian General Davine Roberts.

A voice vote was given by acclamation since no one opposed the slate.

New Business was the next order of business.

Recommendations from the Board of Management were read by the Recording Secretary as follows:

1. That the Bylaw Committee propose an amendment(s) delineating responsibility for the scanning of Lineage Papers and Proof of Service. Motion adopted.
2. That the Society purchase 50 Organizing Chapter, State or Provincial Pins from Pamela Wright, Inc. at a cost of \$51.75 each for a total of \$2,587.50. Motion adopted.
3. That the Society set a price of \$60.00 each, plus postage, for the Organizing Chapter, State or Provincial Pins, with checks payable to the Treasurer General and orders sent to the Supply Chairman. . Motion adopted.
4. That the Society purchase 50 25th Anniversary pins from Pamela Wright, Inc. at a cost of \$39.00 each for a total of \$1,950. Motion Adopted.
5. That the Society set a price of \$55.00 each, plus postage, for the "25th Anniversary Pin". Motion Adopted.
6. That the Organizing Chapter, State or Provincial Pins and Anniversary Pins can be worn on the Official Insignia Ribbon. Motion Adopted.
7. That the Society pay expenses incurred for 24th General Council. Motion Adopted.
8. That the Society ratify the payment of \$23.90 for the 2 year renewal of the Society's website. Motion Adopted.
9. That Governor General Sally Wood Hlavay be made an Honorary Governor General. Motion adopted.

A motion was made to have the Memorial Service at 2:00 P.M. instead of 2:30 P.M. Motion Accepted. The service was given by Chaplain General Carla Odom and assisted by Cher Bucknam.

The meeting was recessed until 6:30 P.M., at which time it was reconvened for the banquet

The installation of Officers was held at the Banquet by Ann Williams.

The meeting was adjourned with "Our Handclasp of Friendship Shall Endure" and followed by "Blessed Be the Tie that Binds".

THE THREE FIRES: OJIBWA, ODAWA & POTAWATOMI

Read at the 2012 Annual Council held in Grand Rapids, MI.

The three Indian tribes most commonly associated with Michigan are the Ojibwa (Chippewa), the Odawa (Ottawa) and the Potawatomi. Closely related in language and culture, these three tribes interacted with each other like members of a family. The Odawa and Potawatomi called the Ojibwa "older brothers." The Odawa were next born and the Potawatomi were the "younger brothers." Together, these three tribes formed the Three Fires Confederacy, a loose knit alliance that promoted their mutual interests.



OJIBWAY

The French called the older brothers of the Three Fires the Ojibwa. Translated, this means "to roast 'til puckered up," describing the unique style of moccasin these people wore. The Ojibwa, a tribe of approximately thirty thousand people, lived along the southern shore of Lake Superior. They maintained a large fishing village at the rapids of the St. Mary's River (present-day Sault Ste. Marie) and were renowned hunters and fishermen.

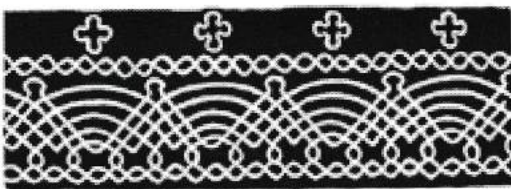
The Odawa, a name that means, "to trade," were skillful intertribal traders. The Odawa also excelled in making bark canoes, which enabled them to trade all over North America. In 1650 the Iroquois pushed the Odawa from Canada to the Straits of Mackinac. They gradually settled along the shores of Lake Michigan in the Lower Peninsula. When the French arrived in the Great Lakes the Odawa had approximately three thousand people.

The Potawatomi, whose four thousand members lived in southern Wisconsin when the Europeans arrived, moved around the southern tip of Lake Michigan and settled in northern Indiana and southwestern Michigan in the early seventeenth century.

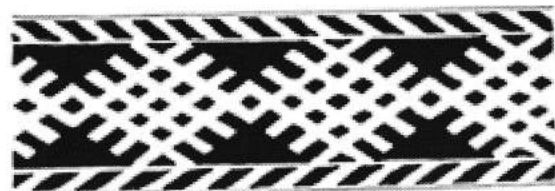
Called "the people of the place of the fire," the Potawatomi are considered among Michigan's earliest farmers. The temperate regions of southern Michigan allowed the Potawatomi to produce squash, corn, melons, beans and even tobacco. As a result, their villages were larger and more permanent than those of the Ojibwa and Odawa.

The years 2010-2012 have been challenging and rewarding for the Continental Society.

Your Executive Board and the State and Provincial Societies met challenges of rejuvenation, reorganization and renewal...and succeeded in making many significant adjustments, accomplishments and contributions to the Continental Society:

- Four issues of the **CALUMET** were published. Karen Miller, Editor
- A Yearbook was printed and made available for purchase. Betsy Jones and Sharon Stine worked together to create a tool for use by the members.
- A Database, which contains information from the application papers of Continental Number 1 to the latest approved application paper Number 1658 was compiled and digitalized. This effort identified each member and has made it possible to extend a hand of friendship to members "missing in action" who have renewed their memberships, elected to become a Member at Large or moved their memberships to another State or Provincial Society due to the dissolution of their State Society in the past. Sharon Stine, Ann Scott Williams, Betsy Jones and Judy Farrigan spent many hours to verify each entry.
- An up-to-date mailing list was created from the information gathered for the Database.
- A Website was designed and updated to provide information and forms necessary to conduct the work of our chapters, state and provincial societies and the Continental Society. Betsy Jones, Webmaster
- The Society awarded Five Scholarships during the 2010-2012 administration. Please note that support of the Native American Scholarship is the ONLY official project of the Continental Society. Your support guarantees the continuation of the fulfillment of the Object of the Continental Society. Leslie Canavan, Chairman
- The Bylaws, as amended September 18, 2010, were printed in the winter 2012 Volume of the **Calumet**. The Bylaws are now in the hands of every member as of that publication.

Based upon the cooperation of the State and Provincial Societies, a new Yearbook will be available for purchase shortly after the end of the Annual Council Meeting.

May I paraphrase President Gerald R. Ford's words to the 1975 Helsinki Convention? ..." the Executive Board takes this work and the objects of the Society (CSDIW) seriously. It has spared no effort to ease tensions and solve problems."

It is a pleasure to report that the Society is in excellent financial status. We were fortunate to set up our CD's when the interest was somewhat higher than it is today. Our Registrar General has gone above and beyond in bringing in many new members. We have sold many society items and paid back the cost of purchasing the items. We are currently holding 12 pre-orders for the new yearbook.

Concerns:

1. Members that pay life membership with their application fee actually cost the society the dues for the chapter and state. There should be at least a year of membership before life membership may be obtained.
2. If a life member stops paying state and chapter dues, they should automatically be moved to Member at Large. In more than one case a life member has been dropped for failure to pay state and chapter dues.
3. It is essential that the Registrar scans all checks before sending them to the bank. That is the only check that I have to figure out how much money has been sent with an application. It is the way the Registrar General and I found the 3 new life members that paid life membership with their application fees.
4. The interest from the Life Member CD and the interest from the General Membership CD are deposited monthly in the Operating account. When the CD's mature the new interest will be half what we are currently receiving. The same will happen to the Virginia Avery Scholarship CD and the General Scholarship CD. Right now we are receiving about \$90 in interest for the operating account and \$124 a month for the scholarship account.
5. The Proposed budget worked for us this last year so I have not changed it for next year.

6. By using Direct Mail and the non-profit bulk mail status that Karen Avery Miller was able to get for the Society we have saved considerable funds. The next Editor will need to have the same sort of arrangement or utilize the same Direct Mail Company.
7. There is a change in the corporation fee. For Non-profit's the fee stays at \$30.00 we will receive a refund for the 2 years we were over-charged.

It has been an honor to serve as the Editor of the society's periodical publication, the *Calumet*, during your administration.

Four issues have been produced, one each in the summer and winter throughout 2010 - 2012.

The goal was to create a bi-annual publication that would inform members of society procedures and events, provide a platform for states to share their happenings, include a variety of forms for easy access, and educate and entertain the reader with articles on the American Indian and/or history related to our society focus. What was silently understood was that the ultimate goal — making sure that all information included in the *Calumet* was based in fact and issued in a timely manner. Typo's that slipped by in the proof reading are always regretted but to the best of my knowledge we met our goals and I believe the membership was pleased with the results.

Let me thank everyone one last time for their support and contributions. Without the input from the officers, state governors, committee chairmen and participating members, who took the time to meet the *Calumet* deadlines and submit material to fill its pages, this periodical would not have been as successful. And a very special thank-you to you, the Governor General, for your advice and support every step, of the way.

Since no history of markings were passed on to this chairman, she has been working on recreating a history for markings which have been placed on graves or elsewhere. Scholarships Leslie Canavan

During the summer of 2012 our Society awarded two scholarships to deserving Native American college students. These students' applications were evaluated and ranked by three professionals in the field of education, Dr Paul Nygard and Margaret Carr, M. S. Ed., of St. Louis, Missouri, and Mrs. William Keller, M.S. Ed., of Indialantic, Florida. The Society owes a debt of gratitude to these individuals for their time and care in this project.

Ten complete applications were evaluated prior to sending to the judges. The applicants were located in seven states, MN, AZ, AK, CA, IN, AR & Washington State. There were thirty-three inquiries, all of whom were sent information and/or application packets. Several were not in the right year of school or pursuing career tracks that fit our requirements. These inquiries arrived by regular mail, email and telephone, several from our website, some from other scholarship websites and some directly from schools whose financial aid offices keep our scholarship offering on file.

This year two scholarships were awarded, one of \$5,000 and one of \$2,500. Victoria Baldwin of Page, Arizona, a Navajo Indian, attends Arizona State University majoring in psychology, criminology and criminal justice. She intends to use her education to return to her community to assist others to find healthy ways to cope with the many obstacles of life.

The \$2,500 awardee is Chrystal M. Carter-McFarland of Bellingham, WA enrolled at Northwest Indian College, and a member of the Lummi Nation. She is majoring in Social Services with the intention of returning to her community in a role in Child Protective Services, chemical dependency or vocational programs that will help bring positive change to the community and personal help to the residents.

Both awardees had the references, grade point average, personal commitment and financial need to receive our support. Working with our applicants and correspondents has been very rewarding, an opportunity which is much appreciated by this chairman. It has been an honor to serve the Continental Society and this administration.

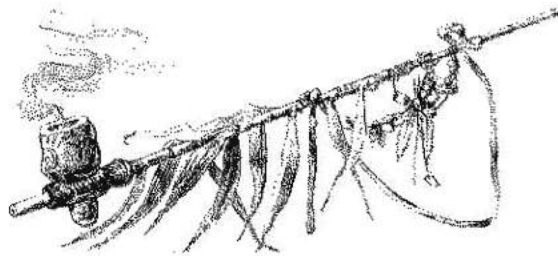
Texas, Continued

THE CALUMET

A long-stemmed sacred or ceremonial tobacco pipe used by Native American tribes.

The Calumet, or Sacred Pipe, is a religious object central to belief, ritual and ceremony among many tribes throughout most of the North American continent.

Among many tribes, native oral tradition attributes the pipe dates to the creation of time. Thought to be given to the people by holy beings, tribal members were instructed in use through visions.

European explorers and settlers, as early as 1535, were greeted with this symbol of native religious life. A Catholic priest noted in 1658 that through the use of the pipe, tribal differences ended, alliances were formed or strengthened, travelers safeguarded, weapons deflected and strangers greeted. Pipes were also used during Council discussions, to seal agreements and, according to one source, determine marriages. Women also partook in the “passing of the pipe” ceremonies, and in some tribes, children also were involved.

The origins, use and types of pipes, are as numerous as the tribes themselves. These include holy pipes that were cared for by shaman and rarely were seen by outsiders.

A Plains region holy man once identified the following different ceremonial pipes uses: praying with the people; the Sun Dance; the preamble - used by one individual before council meetings; the peace - smoked during council meetings; the sweat lodge; the medicine man; the eagle; and the woman's. Others included buffalo; rain and trance.

Ownership included individuals, families, clans, societies, bands or by the entire tribal group.

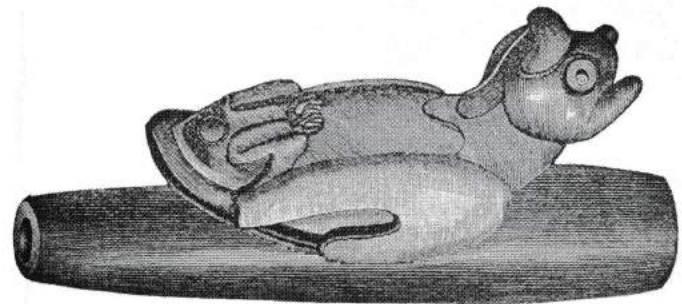
The shapes and types of pipes varied widely, too. Some were made of wood, others only the stems were wood and the bowls were stone. Colors varied with the region.

Some tribes used unadorned pipes. Others had bowls with inlay decorations or carved figures. The stems were often wound with porcupine quills, animal fur, beadwork, cloth fabric or other materials. The stems may also have feathers or other sacred objects attached to them.

Both the stem and the bowl were given to symbolism, including male energy and Mother Earth, and when joined created a power. Many tribes kept them separate except during ceremonies.

Tobacco, either the *Nicotiana* variety, or substances made from the inner bark of particular trees, is considered a sacred plant and is necessary for the pipe and the rituals associated with it. Traditionally, Native Americans did not often use the drug recreationally. Aside from using in their pipes, Native Americans would use tobacco for medicinal uses from curing toothaches, to curing colds.

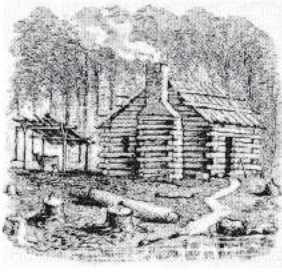
During the summer of 2012 our Society awarded two scholarships to deserving Native American college students. These students' applications were evaluated and ranked by three professionals in the field of education, Dr. Paul Nygard and Margaret Carr, M. S. Ed., of St. Louis, Missouri, and Mrs. Bill Keller, M.S. Ed., of Indialantic, Florida. The Society owes a debt of gratitude to these individuals for their time and care in this project.

Ten complete applications were evaluated prior to sending to the judges. The applicants were located in seven states, MN, AZ, AK, CA, IN, AR & Washington State. There was a total of thirty-three inquiries all of whom were sent information and/or application packets. Several were not in the right year of school nor pursuing career tracks that fit our requirements. These inquiries arrived by regular mail, email and telephone, several from our website, some from other scholarship websites and some directly from schools whose financial aid offices keep our scholarship offering on file.

This year two scholarships were awarded, one of \$5,000 and one of \$2,500. Victoria Baldwin of Page, Arizona, a Navajo Indian, attends Arizona State University majoring in psychology, criminology and criminal justice. She intends to use her education to return to her community to assist others to find healthy ways to cope with the many obstacles of life.

The \$2,500 awardee is Chrystal M. Carter-McFarland of Bellingham, WA enrolled at Northwest Indian College, and a member of the Lummi Nation. She is majoring in Social Services with the intention of returning to her community in a role in Child Protective Services, chemical dependency or vocational programs that will help bring positive change to the community and personal help to the residents.

Both awardees had the references, grade point average, personal commitment and financial need to receive our support. This committee activity is very rewarding and hopefully the next chairman will agree!

The Assistant Registrar General, Jo Hill, approves all Supplemental Applications. ALL Supplemental applications must be sent to the ASSISTANT Registrar General.

When completing a Supplemental application and referencing another Application as proof, you must send a copy of the original approved application. Neither the Registrar General nor the Assistant Registrar General has copies of all approved applications. ALL Original Applications are archived at the Atlanta History Center in Atlanta, GA.

Please use the convenient CHECK LIST form provided, and include ONE COPY with each Application or Supplemental. To receive notification of approval, the Registrar's and the Applicant's Email addresses MUST BE INCLUDED.

The Registrar General and Assistant Registrar General look forward to receiving and approving your well prepared and well documented CSDIW Applications and Supplementals.

- Applications will be not be processed nor inquiries answered during any holidays. Officers are entitled to vacations like everyone else. The cutoff for the processing of applications will be three weeks before Annual Council.
